As the year 2025 draws to a close, it is a good time to reflect as to where we currently are, compared to how the year began.

For Good Shepherd Lutheran Church 2025, it was a definite roller coaster ride with many "twists and dips." It began with our pastor's abrupt resignation, and a newly elected council. By April, several members of Good Shepherd resigned from the congregation, including several members of the new council, as the challenge of survival was very great.



However, God blessed us with the opportunity to have several pastors lead our worship, as well as trying different styles of worship, including video sermons. Lay people discovered new callings of ministry and have been leading the worship services on the Sundays that we have not had a pastor. Offerings have continued to provide for Holy Communion twice a month, and sometimes three times a month.

The end of June saw the congregation at the point of being able to sign a contract with Pastor David Andert for six months, to be our "Part-time Interim Pastor." Pastor David has been a real blessing and stabilizing presence for us. With Holy Communion two times a month for sure, our attendance and offerings have stabilized. In November, the council approved a new contract with Pastor David that is open-ended.

At the beginning of June, another twist was added to the challenge. Our Music Director, Charlotte Hawley, had an accident, and has been unable to be with us the rest of the year. Even though it hasn't been the same pianist every Sunday, God has provided a pianist for us continually.

What began as a challenging year ended with so many blessings that it is difficult to list them. However, it is most important that we remember that it is God who is the provider of those blessings and to thank Him for all that He has done for Good Shepherd.
